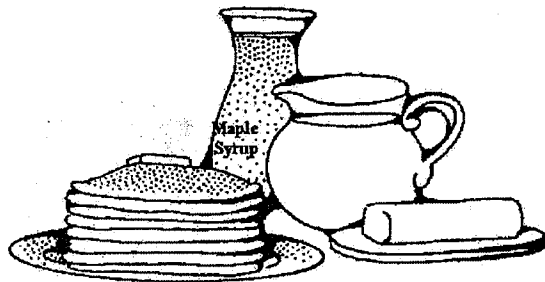

11 am to 3 pm**

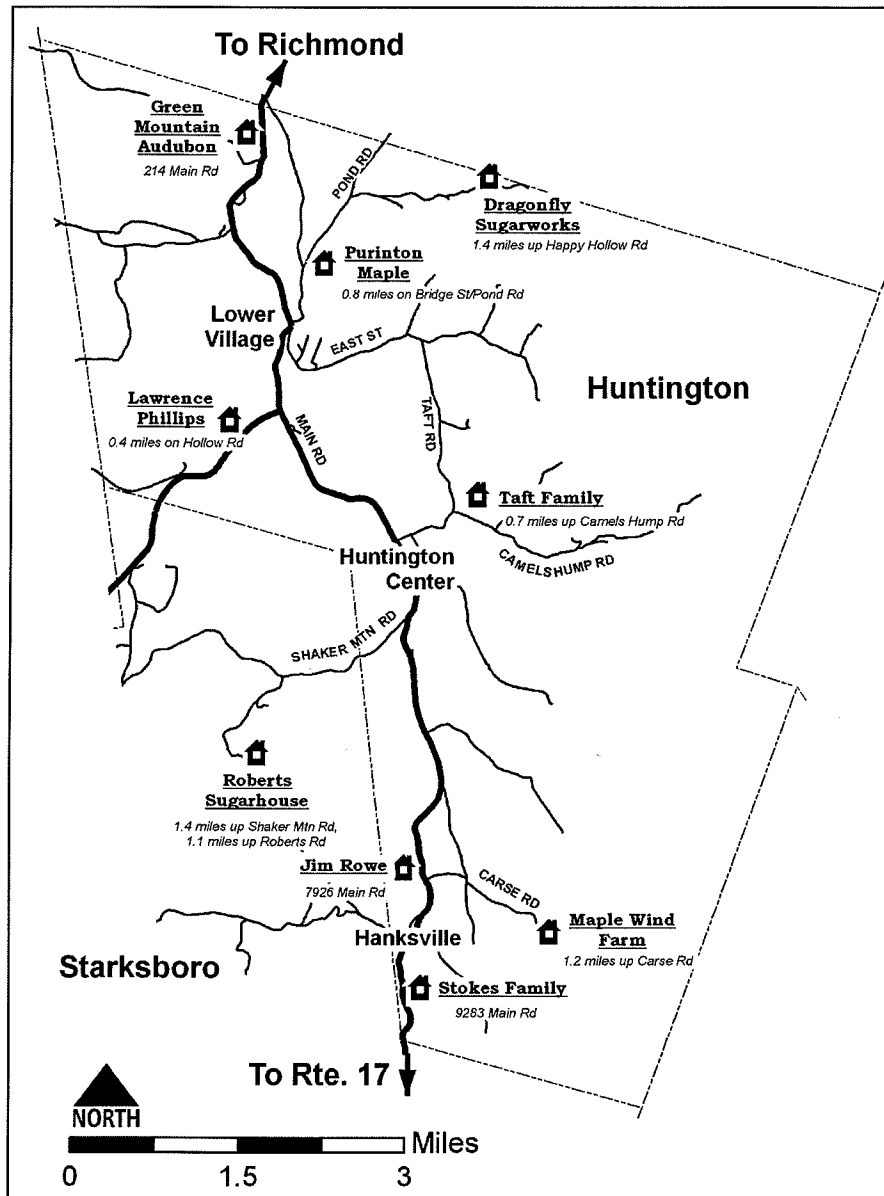

Maple sugaring is an integral part of the Vermont economy and our way of life, yet its future is uncertain. Warming temperatures have already caused Vermont tappers to begin collecting sap a full month ahead of their ancestors. Climate change models predict that Vermont's average yearly temperature could rise by 6-10°F, giving us the climate of mid-Atlantic states by 2060.

This change in winter temperatures will be detrimental to the syrup industry because there needs to be a prolonged period of below 25°F temperatures to get high sugar content in the sap, and a freeze/thaw cycle of cold nights and warm days is required to get the sap flowing. When the nights no longer freeze, the season is over. A warmer climate also encourages pests, such as the maple-loving pear thrip. Curbing greenhouse gas emissions is a necessity to preserve the future of the maple industry in Vermont. The HCC encourages people to walk, carpool, or use other means of non-motorized transportation when visiting Huntington's sugar houses this spring.
